### Our trip to Marwell Zoo

"On Tuesday 14th October, eleven students had a visit to Marwell Zoo as part of their GCSE RE course on Religion and Animal Rights. After an educational talk about endangered animals the group split into two and walked around the park, admiring the animals. There were hundreds of animals, such as leopards, rhinos, and meerkats. After a fun, busy day everyone returned with some great pictures and memories of a brilliant day."

"We saw a tiger spraying on the window, a snake, a snow leopard and cub, a rhino, giraffes, a bird sanctuary, wallabies, turtles, an alligator, tapirs, camels, meerkats, penguins, zebra, oryx, a red panda and capybaras."

Marwell Zoo provided a workshop on engendered species, and the conservation work they do to help preserve animals at risk from extinction, and their habitats. Pupils were able to meet and touch two live animals; a Royal Python and Sally the stick insect. The pupils were considerably braver than the staff in getting to know these creatures close-up!

### Art & Design



Visiting artist and basket maker, Tim Johnson, has been working with the pupils at The Key for the first two weeks in December. The pupils have learnt about basket weaving at every stage – from growing and preparing willow to the weaving itself. Some of the pupils have been working as a team to create woven large scale sculptures that will be affixed to trees outside the art classroom. Other pupils have been creating bowls and plates with assistance and guidance from Tim. Perhaps the most stunning achievement is the collaborative creation of masks as shown in the picture above.

Pupils have taken an active interest in Tim's career and artistic background. Tim has gained popularity amongst staff and pupils for his innovative and inspiring designs and how he has adapted his style to suit all abilities. Everybody at The Key has appreciated his input and hopes he can come again.

In the food and nutrition lessons we tend to have two main areas of focus:-

- 1. To widen the pupils' experience of foods and tastes, encouraging them to be braver and try new things; and
- 2. To give them the knowledge and skills to be able to produce nourishing, tasty and low-cost meals for themselves (and for their own eventual families) as they grow up.

## Food and Nutrition

Each recipe has a skills objective built in and we focus on the acquisition of basic skills, such as weighing and measuring, cutting, slicing, dicing, mixing, rubbing in, rolling out, boiling, simmering and serving up; all of which will be useful across the range of cooking projects we undertake, and in their own lives.

We take the notion of working safely, sensibly and harmoniously very seriously and "cleaning as you go" is encouraged as a sensible way of working. All pupils are expected to wash up, dry up and put away all the tools and dishes they have used during their cooking sessions, and hopefully they will enjoy the benefits of this at home as well.

This term we have made a Szechuan Chicken Stir-Fry; Southern Fried Chicken with Dipping Sauces; a Sausage and Vegetable Casserole; Mini-cheesecakes; Slow-cooked Pepper Steak; Chocolate Chip Shortbread; Pizza; Cheese, Leek and Potato Bake; Corned Beef Hash; Chilli Con Chicken; Chocolate Fudge; plus seven different types of cake (each class baked a different one) which were sold to raise funds for the Coffee afternoon we held on the 26th September 2014. This was in aid of the Macmillan Cancer charity, which provides nurses to support patients in their own homes, in hospitals and hospices. Well done everyone!

This Autumn term has seen the pupils thinking about two very different topics; Sex and Relationship Education and Personal Finance.

#### Sex and Relationship Education


The pupils have thought about the different kinds of relationships that exist between people, and how a regular friendship might develop over time to become a more intimate relationship. We looked at the things that made a good relationship and those things that can make a relationship deteriorate. As a group we discussed the age of consent and how this might have an effect on the pupils themselves. The pupils also thought about the changes that happen to our bodies during puberty and how this can have an effect on our relationships with the opposite sex. We looked at what might happen if we do not use appropriate contraception, and how we can treat STIs.

#### Personal Finance

In personal finance, we have been looking at the different services and support available to the pupils when it comes to their own money. The pupils have looked at how much money they receive and how they choose to spend it each week, and how they might be able to save some of their money if they choose to budget their finances correctly. Each group also had a challenge to raise as much money as possible for two different local charities.

This term in English we have been studying different media based around life in World War One. We have watched and had discussions around the film 'War Horse', which has opened lots of the pupils' eyes to the conditions the soldiers had to deal with in the trenches and the huge amount of casualties on 'No-Man's Land'.

Having watched the film, they have written letters as if they were soldiers from the trenches, including the strong emotions they thought the soldiers would have experienced and the sort of language that would have been appropriate for the time of the war.



The pupils assisted me in creating a beautiful wall display of "The Christmas Truce" by Carol Ann Duffy, a poem written about the cease fire that occurred on Christmas Day in 1914 and the communication that went on between the two sides of the war. We then looked at the language in the poem and discussed how the poem made us feel about the war.

They have been very sensitive in the way they have approached the subjects raised and have shown great maturity in the discussions we have had. There has been some lovely work produced and overall I am proud of the pupils who have participated in this topic.

### Design Technology



A great many artefacts have been made this term with a good variety of designs and materials used. The pupils are developing their skills all the time and are gaining in confidence with hand and machine tools, to the extent where they are becoming far more independent. The introduction of the laser cutter has meant that pupils have a hands on experience of CADCAM (computer aided design computer aided manufacture) and have used the technology to improve both the accuracy and aesthetic quality of their work.

#### Mrs Jane Hiscock - ELSA

At the beginning of September I took up the post of ELSA (Emotional Literacy Support Advisor) at The Key Education Centre. I had previously worked at Crofton School for nine years, for the last four, working in the same role. An ELSA works with pupils who have low self-esteem and need help in understanding their emotions. This in turn helps them to understand the emotions of others and encourages them to build healthy relationships whilst increasing their resilience. An ELSA programmme initially runs for a six week period but can be ongoing depending on individual circumstances during this time, sessions are a mixture of one-to-one consultation, activities and sometimes games.

A Pupil Referral Unit is a very different environment to mainstream school, and the relationships that you have the opportunity to build with the pupils are very different but in essence more rewarding, tiny steps of progress feel huge. I can truthfully say that I have loved getting to know the pupils, feel honoured that they have trusted me enough to confide some of their anxieties, worries and also their successes.

As Christmas approaches I feel very much part of the family, every member of the team, from the very first day have made me feel welcome and I feel thoroughly supported in my role. Christmas will bring a well deserved break and I hope that the New Year is happy and peaceful for us all.
